President & CEO Message

As we open 2026, we are reflecting on a year that revealed both the growing needs of Utahns and the extraordinary compassion of those who step forward to help. For 122 years, Utah Food Bank has remained committed to our mission of *Fighting Hunger Statewide*, serving all 29 counties and responding as needs evolve. With the support of generous donors, volunteers, and partners, we have now **provided more than one billion meals free of charge to Utahns over the decades.**

After completing our first full fiscal year operating with an expanded network of distribution hubs, we are proud to share the impact that each of our new facilities made during 2025 in their respective service areas:

Utah Food Bank Southern Distribution Center: Serving five counties in southwestern Utah, our Southern Distribution Center distributed 6.5 million meals through 34 partner agencies. This included serving 93,000 Mobile Pantry clients at 14 sites and 90,000 children through 19 Mobile School Pantry sites. In addition, our UFB Hurricane Valley Food Pantry was visited by 13,000 households.*

Utah Food Bank Timpanogos Distribution Center: Across its ten-county service area in central Utah, our Timpanogos Distribution Center distributed 8 million meals through 48 partner agencies. Our outreach efforts served 8,100 Mobile Pantry clients at two sites and 30,000 children through 12 Mobile School Pantry sites.*

Utah Food Bank Southeastern Distribution Center: Serving San Juan and Grand counties, our Southeastern Distribution Center distributed 1.4 million meals through eight partner agencies. In addition, there were 100,000 household visits at our three area food pantries: UFB Southeastern Distribution Center, UFB Montezuma Creek Food Pantry, and UFB Monument Valley Food Pantry.*

Thanks to the strength of our statewide network of partners, distribution centers, and direct-service programs, and especially the support of our donors, Utah Food Bank distributed 69.6 million pounds of food free of charge this year—equivalent to 58 million meals for Utahns facing hunger.

Behind every number is a story: a family able to stretch their budget a bit further; a senior who doesn't have to skip meals; or a child who can focus on school because they are no longer hungry. But behind each of those stories is you—our donors, volunteers and partners. These moments happen every day because you chose to care. Thank you for standing with Utah Food Bank and with the thousands of Utahns whose lives are brighter, stronger, and more hopeful because of you.











Kristy lives near Salt Lake City with her husband and their two children, Anthony and Neva. Like many working families, both parents hold full-time jobs, yet entry-level wages can make it difficult to keep up with rising costs, especially groceries for a growing household.


When expenses stretch too far, Kristy turns to a nearby food pantry, one of Utah Food Bank's 309 partner agencies. The support helps bridge a temporary gap, ensuring the family has nutritious food while they work to stay on their feet. "Having that help gives us breathing room," Kristy shared. "It allows us to focus on our kids and keep moving forward."

Access to food does more than ease financial pressure, it provides stability and peace of mind. With fewer worries about meals, the family can spend time together cooking, laughing, and supporting one another.




